"Food Civics: Reinventing Citizenship
in the Raw Milk Underground"

Food citizenship calls for re-envisioning consumers as active participants in food systems. As a concept, it has been widely used in public debates and scholarly literature to emphasize the growing role of civic society in shaping how food is grown, transported, consumed, and disposed of. Yet, little has been done to consider how these thriving food movements are

transforming the public sphere and the notion of citizenship itself. Focusing on activists seeking to legalize raw milk in the United States and European Union's easternmost member states, this presentation will discuss the heated contestations over illegal foods and what they can tell us about the changing models of citizenship.
